DEBORAH LAFORET – Lead Minister, St. Paul's United Church

I remember life in January of 2020. I remember going to the gym about three times a week. I remember planning for a great national youth conference called Rendezvous that would occur in August. I remember planning a pancake supper, an annual meeting, and a spectacular P.I.E. Day event, that we had moved a week earlier to March 8th.

Carolyn and I had met a few times and we had such plans for the coming year. But, of course, all those plans fell apart on Friday, March 13, 2020, when the executive of Council decided to shut down the church building. Instead, our focus turned to how we would offer youth group that evening and how we would offer worship the following Sunday. (You can watch the service on YouTube if you want a refresher on how we did and how much we've grown.)

Amidst the lockdown and the closure of the church, we still did ministry and it has been an eventful year.

- Most of Lent, and all of Holy Week and Easter were celebrated online, as we slowly learned how to livestream worship to Facebook and offer the recording on YouTube.
- We said goodbye to Ross, as he completed his ministry with St. Paul's and retired as a church musician. We said goodbye in a variety of ways; people sent cards, we honored his ministry during worship, and invited people to drive by the church and say goodbye from their vehicles.
- We welcomed Catherine Arcand-Pinette to our staff team. Although she helped us through the first few months of the pandemic, she was officially hired June 1st.
- We hosted two weeks of VBS through Zoom and YouTube videos.
- Throughout the pandemic, we have learned how to stay connected through our phone tree. Thanks to all those who have been calling and connecting!
- We lost loved ones and, while some celebrations of life were postponed, others continued at the church or at a funeral home with minimal attendance, but appreciated by many who watched the livestream.
- On October 18th, 90 of us gathered on Zoom and voted to become an Affirming Ministry, and then on November 22nd, celebrated that status during worship as the 235th Affirming Ministry, with many of our community friends and guest speaker, Pam Rocker.
- You'll hear from our Children's Programming Coordinator that our attendance has increased as kits were put together for at-home Sunday School, and gatherings over Zoom on Sunday mornings.

- Jeff & Jay searched all over for Jeff Kargus and then travelled to community service agencies in Oakville.
- I wrote a pageant that set the Christmas story within a pandemic. The pageant was shared and performed all over Canada and the children of St. Paul's Sunday School eagerly participated and gave a wonderful performance.
- Christmas was eventful with Pubs & Pews hosting "A Christmas Tale," Catherine hosted Carols by Request, our Longest Night service was hosted on Zoom and live-streamed to Facebook, and we celebrated two Christmas Eve services, with youth offering a special candlelight "Silent Night" at both.
- As St. Paul's lost much of its income due to a decrease of Sunday offerings and a loss of rental
 income, many continued to share generously by mail, through our website, and through e-transfers.
 We came through 2020 with a deficit, but it was the deficit we had predicted at the beginning of
 the year, and this is all thanks to wage support from the government and the generosity of our
 members.
- I'm sure I could list much more, but as you can see, we had to shut our doors, but our hearts and ministry remained wide open. 2020 proved to us like never before that the church is not about the building; it's about the people.

As we read in our bible in the Hebrew book of Proverbs (3:5-6):

Trust Yahweh with all your heart, and don't rely on your own understanding. acknowledge God in everything you do, and God will direct your paths.

This was a year we couldn't rely on our own understanding as everything seemed to shift under our feet and the world seem chaotic and unstable. This was the year to trust Yahweh, to acknowledge the divine presence in all we do, and to allow the Spirit to direct our paths. 2021 could be very similar.

I miss all of you. I really miss shaking hands and gathering over meals and in meetings and discussion groups. I miss spending time with the children and youth during camps and youth retreats. I miss having coffee at El Spero's and gathering together to celebrate the loss of someone we love. I rejoice though that we have not lost our connections, that we can still pray together and learn together, and that we can still be the body of Christ to our community and one another. Thanks be to God.

CAROLYN SMITH - Minister of Pastoral Care, St. Paul's United Church

Thanks to all who have steered me to folks who weren't on my radar, or shared news that I needed to know. It has been invaluable at the times of loss as we have said goodbye to several friends this year.

I love our resilient community - our Affirm vote, Pubs & Pews, and Women's zoom, Catherine's choirs, Tracy's Sunday school, justice learning, Kerr St support, Youth group, Rendezvous, Book Club, music events and Longest Night. Weddings and even funerals have shown joy and love, and loving sorrow, and hope for our future together, and they sustained us in real ways while we wait for better times.

Despite all that 2020 threw at us, in all the ways that matter, we are still St. Paul's.

CATHERINE ARCAND-PINETTE, MMus- Director of Music, St. Paul's United Church

2020 was a year full of changes and new endeavours for the music of St. Paul's. The year began normally enough with our Adult Choir sharing music every Sunday morning with Ross at the helm. When COVID hit in mid-March and the church was forced to move online, I was asked to take over to create digital music for online services until we were able to meet again in person. And so, here we are! Still meeting online, but, I believe, challenging ourselves to create and provide new digital musical content each week while encouraging the involvement of as many people as possible.

Before the beginning of COVID, our long time musical director Ross Stretton had decided to retire, and we sadly said goodbye to him in June 2020. He will be greatly missed. I was excited to be selected as his replacement and looked forward to finding new ways to bring music into the St. Paul's community as the pandemic continued.

I started off recording myself playing hymns and solos in my basement. Quickly, I realized that I was missing the harmony from our choir in the hymns and wanted to create better sounding content, so I began to learn how to do multi-track recording, first on the iPad and ultimately on my laptop. With this kind of layered recording, I could now include other musicians as well. Chris Arcand became a regular contributor and I was able to welcome guest musicians like Deborah Laforet, Anna Sheridan-Jonah, Josh Laforet and Ella Pinette to help create new pieces of special music. With these completed musical recordings, I was putting together photo slide shows to accentuate the music or the message, using photos that were available for free public use. I choose these images with great care so that they create a seamless artistic expression of the song; visual art and music combined. I even tried a few small choir ensembles, but what I was really missing was our St. Paul's Adult Choir.

By the summer, I felt that I had enough skill and time to try tackling an anthem with the St. Paul's Adult Choir. I chose a familiar anthem "As the Deer", created practice tracks and invited them to try and record themselves singing the anthem. I have been so proud to see the members of the choir embrace this new idea with open arms and with all of their enthusiasm! It has been a steep learning curve for all involved, but they have handled it with patience (and sometimes exasperation and frustration), and always with good humour. This was the first time I tried to include all the video of the choir members together in one video and is yet another new skill I can add to my list! With the success of that anthem, the Adult Choir began rehearsals via Zoom on Thursday evenings and welcomed back some members that had moved far away. Today, we usually have 13 people at practice and anywhere between 13 and 20 voices on our recordings.

In the fall, I started to try to branch out and see if I could include different musicians and groups into the fold. The JR Worship Band, which includes 8 musical youth, had its first rehearsal and recorded "Oceans" for a service in November. Brian Lytle joined me with his harmonica we collaborated for some beautiful postludes and preludes. Thea Sheridan-Jonah shared her voice for a solo in the spring and Ron Brown and Taeyhung Chris Lee joined me for solos in the fall. We partnered with Merriam Music's Enriched Piano Program to help support these young, budding musicians by giving them a place to showcase their talent. The Worship Band was able to send in tracks for a fantastic piece on

Christmas Eve, and the Joyful Noise was able to send me voices and videos for two amazing pieces: one in the spring and one at Christmas.

I recently discovered that my friend and colleague from Merriam, Len Feldman, is the Musical Director at Erin Mills United Church and he and I have begun sharing resources and collaborating. I have also endeavoured to create a new digital, searchable online choir music catalogue to make it easier to search and find music for certain occasions, difficulty level, or based on certain verses in scripture. With the help of a high school volunteer, this project is well on its way.

Always looking for a new way to connect online in this challenging time, we were able to try a "Carols by Request" online carol sing over Zoom. This was very well attended and appreciated by all, so we have resolved to try and do more of these social singalongs in the future. Stay tuned!

I am blessed to have this opportunity to share my music with the St. Paul's community. In this challenging time, music can offer so much light. It can express the inexpressible. It can sooth the soul in times of stress and hardship. This year has definitely had its share of difficulties, but I am so proud to say that in 2020, I was able to create 110 hymns, 44 pieces of piano music and almost 50 videos of special music, solos and anthems. This is content that we will have forever, to use and reuse as needed. I look forward to the time when we can sing together in joy from the beautiful building that is home to our hearts, but I am also so thankful to be reminded that the church is more than just a building, and every time I create music for Sunday service, or meet with the JR Worship Band, or have choir practice on a Thursday evening, I feel the Creator at work.

TRACY MITCHELL – Children's Programming Developer, St. Paul's United Church

Sunday School (JK-grade 6)

2020 was a year of change and adapting for the children of St Paul's. They have proven over and over again just how resilient they are. Sunday school attendance has actually grown significantly despite the pandemic! Prior to the pandemic we would only have about 5 to 8 children in attendance at the church each week. Now we have 18 children enrolled in our online program who attend on a regular basis.

AFFIRMING TEAM - Thea Sheridan-Jonah, Team Chair

As I read over the affirm annual report from last year, I was somewhat amazed that last year was our first full year as a committee. In this past year we have done more than I could have ever imagined, and I could not be more grateful for the congregation and affirming team that made it all possible.

Most notably, this year we became an officially affirming church. With a tremendous turnout of 90 people on zoom on October 18, 2020 we voted and became affirming. This is a success to be incredibly proud of and it would not have been possible without the work of the affirming team, promotion of the phone tree callers, and support of our ministers. Thank you to the 2020-2021 Committee of Chris Lee, Kate Labelle, Kristina Kriston, co-chairs Judy DeMone and I, and our ministers Deborah Laforet and Carolyn Smith who are dedicated to our work both within and outside of the committee. Gary Davis stepped down from the committee in the fall and we thank him for his contributions.

Part of the success of this year came from the ability to transfer to online events but is all started in March with our PIE day. PIE Day was one of the last in person events St. Paul's held and it full of amazing food and conversations. Shortly after PIE day everything shut down and we transitioned to online programming. This included guest preachers and speakers like Pam Rocker, Junia Joplin and Sarina Sarraf. Then, online Pride services with guests Marcus Logan and Ally Philips, and internal committee work to draft our continuing plan of action and plan the affirming vote.

Currently, we are selling affirming rainbow masks made by a local artist.

Finally, we have come full circle with our PIE day coming up in March. This year we are having two online PIE day events online as well as integrating PIE into Sunday School and the Sunday service.

The main events are on Friday March 12th at 7pm; we are hosting a Coffee House for youth from within and beyond St. Paul's to share their music, poems, and anything else on the theme of belonging. We will be livestreaming the event on Facebook for all non-youth to watch.

Then on Saturday March 13th at 10:30 am – 11:30 am we will have as our guest speaker Michael Blair, the new (November 2020) General Secretary of the United Church of Canada. He will be speaking on intersectionality. Intersectionality is the need for diverse voices - for example when we talk about the LGBTQQIA+ community we do not exclude LGBTQQIA+ people of colour, disabled/people with disabilities, people in different classes and more. We will be joined by other affirming churches in the area (Port Nelson in Burlington and Applewood and Erin Mills in Mississauga, Royal York in Etobicoke), as well as two churches who are in the process of becoming affirming (Erin Mills in Mississauga and and East Plains in Burlington). We will send out more information through the newsletter and on social media so keep an eye out for all to come.

CAPITAL PROJECTS - Harold DeVenne, Team Chair

Capital Projects Team – Sanctuary Renovation

This year had its surprises and wins. We submitted our Rezoning Application in February and received a date for the public meeting for April. This date was then cancelled due to Covid, and then rescheduled as a virtual meeting in June. There were no public submissions presented and our application was accepted for review by the Town.

The two large signs went up on the lawn of both the church and the manse, and very few comments have been received from the neighbours. These signs will be removed once our re-zoning application is approved by Town Council.

The Town reviewed the submission and they asked for further information including drawings by an engineer to show where the water and sewage lines are for both the Manse and the church. We asked the survey firm to give us a couple of options for the lot sizing and started the calculation re number of parking spaces required.

During discussions about parking with a different department at the Town, we discovered that the three metre buffer strip required around the new lot was in fact four and a half metres since it is a parking lot and driveway next to the lot. There is enough space in the parking lot so that we didn't lose spaces, but the length of the new manse lot will be reduced, but still meet town standards.

The parking spaces became an issue since nine of them don't meet current by-law requirements. We could not come up with the original approved site plan for the Sanctuary, so the Town could not give us status as legally non-conforming. We have since come up with a solution that will allow us to move forward and maintain our current parking spaces.

We have submitted all answers to the outstanding comments January 2021. Our application is scheduled to be reviewed and hopefully approved in early March, then we will file our severance application.

After the severance is approved, we have a little work to do prior to being able to put the Manse up for sale. Once the Manse goes up for sale, we will contact the architect and initiate a review of the prior plans for the renovation.

COMMUNICATION – Candace Allen, Team Chair

It certainly has been an interesting, different year. Some of the activities the Communications Team do have been put on hold.

The two main important items are the bimonthly newsletter and the web site.

The newsletter is important because with the church being closed, there is no weekly bulletin to keep everyone up to date on activities. We try to put interesting articles about upcoming events, Zoom meetings and community outreach events. We send out 216 emails with the newsletter, the open rate is around 60% which is 130 people opening.

If there is anyone we are missing and would like to receive this newsletter, please let us know and you name will be added.

Deborah looks after keeping the web site current also with upcoming events, Zoom links and articles of interest. We chose to discontinue working with Social Gourmet and Deborah and Carolyn post updates on Facebook and Instagram. Our social media presence is especially important, even more so now.

Jeff Laforet is our "sign guy". He hopes his quotes on the sign make people smile as they drive along Rebecca Street.

We also post advertisements in the Oakville Beaver, i.e. Christmas and Easter Church service dates and times.

Our team is responsible for compiling the St. Paul's Annual Report with submissions from other Council Teams.

When we finally do open our doors, the Communications Team will keep everyone informed and up to date.

FINANCE TEAM – Darren Pinette, *Team Chair*

St. Paul's finished the 2020 fiscal year with an operating surplus of \$139,418, which was \$197,621 favourable than budget. The operating surplus and budget favourability were driven by a bequest received from the estate of the late John MacKay – a long-time member of the Church – of \$211,000. St. Paul's finished the year with an operating deficit of \$60,582, which was unfavourable to budget by \$2,379, if excluding the impact of the MacKay bequest.

The 2020 budget expected an operating deficit of \$58,203 but did not incorporate any assumptions related to the COVID-19 pandemic. The budgeted deficit was based on the underlying trends in offering income softness as the Church continued its transition and progress toward balancing the budget over the medium term.

The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in St. Paul's being closed for 42 weeks. The closure resulted in lost offering and rental income while the Church continued to incur fixed expenses, including staff salaries and building operating costs. The impact of the closure is estimated to be approximately \$154,000. However, the impact of the closure was largely offset by four factors: congregational offerings submitted via e-transfer or mail, the COVID-related federal government wage subsidy, Council's decision to pause certain expenses and the online bazaar held in the Fall.

St. Paul's Finance Committee expects the Church will continue to operate in a deficit position for 2021, although at a more favourable position relative to 2020 (budgeted operating deficit is \$38,000 in 2021 compared to the \$61,000 deficit in 2020). The 2021 budget is based on the assumption of re-opening the Church in June 2021, with a modest ramp-up in offering and rental income in the back half of the year. Expenses will increase by \$36,000, or 11%, in 2021 driven by a significant reduction in the COVID wage subsidy compared to 2020. Expenses are budgeted to be flat in 2021 if excluding the impact of the wage subsidy.

A financial audit is in progress and we expect it to be completed by the end of March, 2021.

2020 was a quiet year for the St Paul's Outreach Committee. Unfortunately, the restrictions on gathering brought on by the pandemic made it difficult to coordinate meaningful 'hands on' initiatives within the community.

Despite this, we did manage to cater brown bag breakfasts for Kerr Street Ministries on two separate occasions during the year where we provided a balanced breakfast for 75-100 people in need in our community.

The St. Paul's community continues its support of the United Church of Canada's Mission & Service Fund, contributing \$21, 640.00 in 2020.

The 2020 Christmas Offering, totalling \$3, 743.00 was forwarded to the Minister's Benevolent Fund - this fund is used at the discretion of the Ministers to help those in need in our community.

Under the direction of Doris Cassidy, St. Paul's continued its support of the Kiva Loans Program, a non-profit organization that allows people to provide interest-free "micro-loans" to low income entrepreneurs around the world. PROPERTY REPORT - Tom Allen, Bert Fonseca

Sue Macdonald started the year as chairperson, and with family commitments and new employment found she had to pull back. We thank her for her work these past couple of years.

Room Rentals - Jeanne Kho and Michele Swanson-Mousley addressed coordination and timing issues for the greatly reduced rentals due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Garbage Removal - For several months in early pandemic when we did not have renters, Roy McNaught was let go and Harold DeVenne filled in with clearing the garbage and placing at the curb. As renters returned in the summer, Roy was contacted and resumed reduced duties to provide cleaning between renters each week.

Sump Overflow - issue in January 2020 lead to replacement of the sump pump after several attempts to clear the sump and get the old one going were not successful.

Basement Leak Room-8 – Tom Allen and Bryan MacMillan rerouted two downspouts and graded drainage from the north-west corner of the sanctuary, to prevent water ingress in Room-8 and reduce likelihood of west wall leak at the north entrance.

West Wall Leak Near North Entrance - wall cracked below window, no action yet. We should clear the leaves at the scupper first before calling in roofers.

Flat Roof - leak over Notice Board - leaves cleared and downspout thawed. May have to call roofers in spring/summer.

Vacuum Cleaner – Replaced electrical plug.

Lawn Mower/s – Repairs undertaken by Don Cox when someone accidentally tried to take out a tree stump! Normal maintenance consisted of Tom Allen doing some adjustments.

The property team has been without a Chair since Sue MacDonald resigned. It would be nice if someone would volunteer to fill this vacancy to spearhead resolution to the constant property issues that occur during the year.

REFUGEE COMMITTEE – Pat Mason, Co-Chair

In 2020, the Refugee team was co-chaired by Bev Phillips and Pat Mason. Additional team members were Selina Bajorek, Alice DesLauriers-Bunn, Hana Manssor, Matt Sheridan-Jonah, and Deborah Laforet from St. Paul's, along with Gary Dobbie, Chris Middlebro, and Paul Peters from Glen Abbey United Church.

The Refugee Committee has continued to actively support our sponsored family in a variety of ways during 2020. Juleet, her daughter Mariam, and Mariam's husband Salam arrived in Canada on May 13, 2019. Juleet's son Salam arrived in Canada on July 8, 2019. Our official financial sponsorship obligations for these four individuals have now been met. Both Salams have been working steadily and the family unit is now financially independent. We would like to acknowledge Bryan MacMillan for his assistance in providing meaningful employment for these family members.

In April, we had several social distancing meetings with family members regarding housing, as the lease that had been signed by St. Paul's expired June 7, 2020. Various options were explored. Subsequently, the family has renewed the lease on the home at 351 Maurice Drive until the end of June 2021. At the time, we were hopeful that this residence could also become the home for Anas, Suzan (Juleet's daughter), and their boys, once they arrived in Canada.

We have been in regular contact with the United Church of Canada, our MPs, and IRCC (Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada) on the status of our application for Suzan, Anas, and their two sons Tonee and Dani. We have been working through the MP offices of John Oliver and Anita Anand, in order to move the process along. Since September 2019, we have been told that the government is waiting for certain security information from an independent agency that is hired to provide this data.

The worldwide Covid 19 pandemic has upended all aspects of life, including the operation of overseas IRCC offices and international travel. So, we wait. We wait for a paper of security clearance. We wait for IRCC offices to clear backlogs. We wait. In the meantime, living conditions in Lebanon that were precarious even before the advent of Covid 19 are getting steadily worse. The explosion in the harbor area of Beirut last fall destroyed lives, homes, and businesses. Miles away, the windows in Anas and Suzan's one room home, shared with another family, were shattered by the blast. Tonee and Dani, who are now nine and 12 ½ years old, have not been able to attend a formal school since the family fled to Lebanon in 2014. We wait, anxiously to get the family to Canada to begin to build their life here.

STEWARDSHIP TEAM – Michele Swanson-Mousley, *Team Chair*

The year of 2020 was a time of dramatic disruption and ongoing uncertainty. Even now, the pandemic continues to take lives, requires social distancing that upends the global economy, and prevents us from coming together in response to crisis, as we ordinarily would.

The challenges to our faith and religious practice are very real. All of our ways of being a community of faith have been paused, discontinued, or rearranged. Meetings, pastoral care, and worship are all being conducted online, as we isolate in our homes. Every day we read or hear about people who are sick, dying, or vulnerable, as well as about the sacrifices made by healthcare workers and those in other essential professions who enable this large-scale response. In this circumstance, we are beginning to ask about an unknown future. Returning to "normal" seems nostalgic, and even identifying what a "new normal" might look like may be beyond our imagination in these early days of 2021. Yet, we cannot help but look ahead to a time when we resume some of the activities of daily life.

God has a purpose for every season, and in this time of grief and change, the community of St. Paul's has responded to God with faithful stewardship in so many ways. Online worship, emailed newsletters, Zoom coffee hour, and electronic apps instead of offering plates might feel tactical, but they continue to be expressions of our faithfulness in a time of change. Handmade notes, casseroles, muffins, telephone calls and running errands for those of us that cannot risk leaving home keep us connected to each other as we navigate into our second year of living with Covid-19.

The St. Paul's Stewardship Team is grateful for the faithful gifts of this congregation.

UNITED CHURCH WOMEN (UCW) – Pat Mason, Team Representative

The United Church Women (UCW) have the purpose to unite all women of the congregation for the total mission of the Church and to provide a medium through which they may express their loyalty and devotion to Jesus the Christ, in Christian Witness, Fellowship, and Service.

2020, the first year of a global pandemic, resulted in major changes for the UCW. Normally we would have several general meetings each year, as well as monthly unit meetings. The units, Sarah, Live, High 5's, and Mariam attempted to hold meetings either thru zoom, or thru outdoor, socially distanced gatherings when the weather was favourable. In the absence of these regular gatherings, the members kept in touch by phone and other socially distanced means.

In addition to the various unit gatherings, there were two general meetings. On February 11, 2020, the Sarah unit hosted 27 members in a meeting at the church.

Carolyn Smith was our guest speaker, on the topic "The Buyerarchy of Needs". A lively discussion followed of the ways we can be more ecologically friendly to Mother Earth. Members were encouraged to use what they have, borrow, swap, or make items, before resorting to buying. Little did we know that this was an advance tutorial on how to live simply during a worldwide pandemic!

On December 15, 2020, the UCW held a second general meeting to discuss the year end financial picture, and whether we would financially support various community organizations again this year. Eight members participated in a zoom meeting. Despite the fact that the UCW did not host a fundraising project in 2020, it was decided to give increased donations to a reduced number of organizations. We focussed on charities, local if possible, for women, children, youth, and seniors in particular need, due to issues related to mental health stress, marital abuse, and homelessness. This year donations were made to ROCK (Reach Out Centre for Kids), Halton Women's Place, Hope Place Women's Treatment Centre, Kerr Street Ministries, Salvation Army Lighthouse, CAMH (Canadian Association for Mental Health), Ian Anderson House, and Acclaim Health/Alzheimer Services. The total expenditure for this community outreach was \$3500.00.

Helga de Lint continued to coordinate information to be shared with UCW members, Carilyn McNaught was the UCW representative to attend Council meetings, Terry Farris was Corresponding secretary, Pat Mason was Treasurer, Carilyn McNaught and Sue Rumsey were additional signers at the credit union, Joan Ford and Velma Ivey coordinated Outreach for the one funeral we assisted with, and Irene Murray kept us informed about members' changes in addresses or telephone contacts. We are thankful to all these individuals who offered their time, energy, and leadership.

The 2020 Holiday Jingle Bazaar, was a virtual, very successful event, organized by both UCW and nonUCW members of the congregation. This year the monies raised went to the general operating fund for St. Paul's. The UCW would like to congratulate the organizers of this event, Catherine Arcand-Pinette, Candace Allen, Rhiannon Filip, Shirley-Anne Cooper-Maimot, Deborah Laforet, Carilyn McNaught and Grace Jeong, for their efforts. TOTS AND US – Nancy Schaubel, Team Representative

"Tots and Us" is a gently-geared program for preschoolers and babies, along with their caregivers. It runs for one hour, 10-11 a.m. on Monday mornings at St. Paul's. We offer two age-related levels of free play in two of our Sunday School rooms during the first half hour. The children can choose from a variety of toys and activities in these spaces.

At 10:30 a.m., it's time to move into the small auditorium where music and story time take place, led by Catherine Arcand-Pinette. Our small guests can visit our library to colour or check out books and videos before they leave for home.

Sadly, due to COVID-19 restrictions, the "Tots and Us" program came to an abrupt end on March 9, 2020. At that time, there were 24 registrations with an average of 5-6 children attending every week.

Pubs & Pews continued in an online format throughout 2020 because of the Pandemic. As a result, many new members were able to join the group from the comfort of their own homes! In a year that proved challenging for many reasons, the pandemic didn't stop this group gathering to share a laugh.

HOLIDAY JINGLE BAZAAR - Candace Allen, Event Leadership Team

The Holiday Jingle was held "virtually" this year. There were three different online "vendors": the Country Store organized by Catherine Arcand-Pinette, Candace Allen and Rhiannon Filip, the Silent Auction gift baskets organized by Shirley-Anne Cooper-Maimot and the Knitting Table organized by Carilyn McNaught and Grace Jeong.

The Country Store was done based on pre-ordered food this year. Instead of purchasing the products that had been prepared, we asked many wonderful volunteers what they would like to make and then took orders online for those products. Some suggestions were soup, macaroni and cheese and of course our famous tourtieres. There were some jams and preserves and candy like chocolate bark, fudge, peanut brittle and chocolate covered oreos. A link was prepared in Google Forms which allowed customers to order whatever they would like. The link was open for a week so that the volunteer food preparers had two weeks to prepare the orders and freeze if necessary. The products were then dropped off at the church on Friday December 4 for curbside pick-up Saturday December 5 in half hour intervals in compliance with COVID protocols. It was different but went very smoothly. We received many compliments and felt the Country Store was very successful.

The Knitting table followed the same design. They took pictures of sweaters, mittens and baby items. The pictures and description was put on Google Forms and customers could order whatever items they would like. Grace and Carilyn organized the items and had them ready for curbside pick-up on the Saturday.

The Auction Gift baskets were done a little differently. Because it needed to be a "live" auction (meaning people could bid on the baskets and outbid others like a silent auction), pictures and descriptions were posted on Facebook and customers could bid on any item, in the "comments" section and outbid their competitors. There were over 45 gift baskets donated. The auction was open for a week. Once all the bids were in, Shirley Anne was in touch with the winners and they came to pick up their baskets on the Saturday.

Although this Holiday Jingle Bazaar was very different, we were incredibly proud of its success. Our profit from all three "vendors" was \$4,138.70. This money was put into the General Account to help offset some of the costs we are incurring with having a "closed" church.

We may do something similar next year or a combination of both events, in person shopping and virtual shopping. Stay tuned.

As with all organizations, Scouts Canada has had to pivot to accommodate various health restrictions and local regulations. We have put policies in place that comply with these rules, as well accommodate what our volunteers, youth and families are comfortable with, given their home situation. (Some may only be interested in virtual activities, while others are interested in specific in-person activities when they are allowed.)

1. 7th Trafalgar Group Committee

The 7th Group Committee is made up of Parents and Volunteers who support the Section Scouters and organize events and fundraising activities to help support the Group's Youth and Program activities. Unfortunately, due to COVID, we could not run any in-person group events after our Annual Founders Day Pasta Dinner in February. Scouts Canada shifted to online fundraisers Scout Coffee and Scout Seeds. Campaigns are currently underway to fund equipment and supplies used by the Youth as part of their regular program meetings and activities.

2. 7th Trafalgar Scout Group Beaver Scout Colony

Section Overview

Fun and friendship are the cornerstone of the Beaver Scouts program.

Beavers opens the door for your child to discover the world. It is filled with a little bit of everything – outdoor activities, games, music and sports. Along the way, Beaver Scouts meet new friends, learn cooperation and teamwork and develop self-confidence.

2020 Program Year

This year we have went from 24 Beavers to very small number as many families with young children are keeping them close to home due to the pandemic. Before local health regulations prevented in-person activities, the Beavers went sledding, built their Beaver Buggies and ran them in races, and visited a local fire hall. The Beavers then shifted to virtual activities and enjoyed scavenger hunts around the house, crafts and joke nights. When rules allowed, the Beavers went hiking and explored Oakville trails.

Five of our Beavers earned their North Star Award, the top-section award for the Beaver Program. These youths earned their Outdoor Activity Skill (OAS) badges for hiking, winter skills and vertical skills, and performed at least 5 hours of service work. They also organized a diaper drive for a local community organization (with the pandemic, it quickly shifted to an online drive rather than an in-person activity)

3. 7th Trafalgar Scout Group Cub Scout Pack

Section Overview

With the Cub Scouts motto of "Do Your Best" front and center, Cubs are encouraged to try new and more challenging activities. Learning important first aid skills, paddling a canoe for the first time, or leading a game at camp will open the door for Cubs to try other adventures they never thought possible.

Along the way, Cubs learn how to take care of themselves and work as a team – and most importantly have a lot of fun!

2020 Program Year

As with all programming in March of 2020, 7th Trafalgar Cub Pack was disrupted by COVID. We moved to online meetings during lockdown and finished out the remainder of our program year with virtual meetings. The Cub Pack took the summer off as usual. The return to school in September left many questions about what the fall programming may look like. 7th Trafalgar Cubs took a cautious "wait and see" approach before returning to inperson programming mid-October.

Cubs met outside throughout the fall, right up until Christmas. Upon reflection we realize that COVID has forced us to go back to Scouting roots and get everyone outside as much as possible. Indoor meetings are still banned under current regulations.

With the lockdown at Christmas, we had to revert to online programming until mid-February but have since been back outside. Our thriving Cub Pack of 32 has decreased to 20. Membership across Scouting has been challenged as have all extracurricular programs. The smaller group size has been beneficial for programming as we are only allowed to have 16 members present at one time for outdoor events, so we do a rotation to accommodate everyone.

Feedback from parents and youth tell us that being outside is key for most of them. The online programming, although quality and necessary during lockdown feels too much like the rest of their day when they are in front of screens for school.

As the weather improves, we look forward to longer daylight hours and perhaps adding in some day camps to work on Scouting skills as overnight camping is still not allowed.

4. 7th Trafalgar Scout Group Scout Troop

Section Overview

Scouts is about having fun while gaining valuable leadership skills and self-confidence.

Scouts enjoy outdoor adventures like mountain biking, rock climbing and lots of camping while working together with other young people to accomplish thrilling challenges and contribute to their communities.

2020 Program Year

The Scout Troop is now 12 Scouts and 7 Scouters. It has been an interesting year so far with a mix of online and outdoor in-person meetings.

In September, we started the year with a campfire to plan our activities for the balance of the year. Our typical in-person meetings include physical fitness activities like hiking, outdoor games and some basic scout craft activities to work on skills like teamwork, planning and wilderness skills.

Online meetings are used to give the youth a chance to interact with friends, work through survival scenarios and play some interactive games where planning and teamwork comes into focus.

Scouting requires a strong outdoor focus, which is great considering we can't meet indoors this year.

As the weather improves, and if we can get together in person, we will continue with skills like rope lashing, stove and lantern, fire safety, axe and saw safety, knife safety, and outdoor survival skills. We are all looking forward to getting back to camping when permitted.

5. 7th Trafalgar Scout Group Venturer Scout Company

Section Overview

The Venturer Scout program offers exciting, real-life, hands-on experiences for youth. Venturers learn to nurture an active, healthy lifestyle; acquire the knowledge and skills for career development; and participate in thrilling outdoor adventures. Weekend events, extended hikes, Leave No Trace camping, spiritual reflection, community service and round out the Venturer experience.

2020 Program Year

It has been a crazy year since our last Report. We did manage to get a final camp in before the lock down in late February. A 4 night, 5-day adventure at Ragged Falls Scout Camp. (Oxtonge River) Venturers were completely responsible for all elements of planning, preparing and reconciling the camp finances.

The Venturers, alongside the Scouts organized our annual family dinner for all of the 7th Trafalgar Scouting Group on World Thinking Day (Founders Day) each third week in February at St. Paul's Church.

Our Venturers participated and volunteered with clean-up duties following the St. Paul's Pancake dinner.

John Glavota received his Chief Scout Award in June. (Highest achievement award earned by Scouts and 1st year Venturers – 4 years to achieve)

From March to August the group met online (virtually) doing various activities. Planning next canoe trip, Jack Box Games, and Scout Craft (cooking meals) to name a few.
